Officer Chance Lintel

School Resource Officer | Denver Police Department, District 1

Meet Tennyson's new School Resource Officer (SRO), Officer Chanee Lintel from District 1 Denver Police Department!

SROs are a well-recognized fixture in classrooms across the country, but not as typical for organizations like Tennyson. Tennyson partnered with Lt. Daryl Miller of District 1, who took a leadership role in the SRO search, screening, and selection process. The DPD and the City of Denver vetted a number of qualified candidates, and hand-picked Officer Lintel based upon her experience, personal background, and empathy for and understanding of Tennyson's children. Tennyson interviewed Officer Lintel and agreed that she was a great fit.

Officer Lintel's focus will be on relationship building with children on campus and creating bridges between campus kids and our law enforcement partners at DPD. In addition, she will keep the safety and best interest of our children at the forefront while providing additional support to staff, the community, and DPD.

Officer Lintel is a professional resource for the school and will get to know each individual child on campus. She will partner with the client's teachers and therapists, while providing safety and support to students and staff.

"Tennyson was my first job out of grad school and I quickly learned that classroom application of knowledge was very different than real world application, especially working in families' homes and communities.

Every new family has a unique set of challenges and strengths. Working within the community-based program allows me to work closely with families in a wide variety of settings. At a training, I once heard that sometimes trauma work is just 'grocery store therapy,' which points to the idea that trauma is pervasive and isolating; part of the work is empowering people to navigate and integrate into their own communities safely. I have seen the value and power of 'grocery store therapy' first hand for individuals who have experienced complex trauma and/or are impacted by developmental delays.

It's especially rewarding to help a student integrate back in to their school, or hearing a parent report that they witnessed their child using a coping skill we practiced in therapy.

Although behavioral change is complex and there is a lot involved in trauma-informed care, I get to help families take concrete steps toward feeling like successful members of their communities."

"I'm often asked what drives me to work at Tennyson Center for Children and, without a doubt, the clients are the foundational answer to that question.

In general, kids offer a fresh perspective on life, seeing through barriers that adults believe are impossible. Their fresh and unique perspectives challenge the boundaries of 'can't' with, 'What if?' or, 'Why not?'

Our children are not unlike mainstream kids in a lot of ways; they have that same perspective, only they are armored with determination fostered from grit. Add this to their history of surviving unbelievable and seemingly impossible situations, and you get pure inspiration.

Over the last twenty-one years of working at Tennyson Center for Children, it has been impossible for me not to draw upon the children's courage and be moved and changed by it.

It's not easy--doing what we do. But when you can share in a breakthrough with a client that seemed impossible at the time and see them thrive, every growing pain you've experienced with that child along the way becomes worth it. Inevitably, after sending one

inspiring student on their way, another seemingly impossible client arrives, which is when it's important to stop, draw from that courage around you, and ask, 'What if?' or, 'Why not?'



PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT LIFE SKILLS

The goal of Tennyson's Life Skills Program is to set students up for success prior to discharging from Tennyson. Students ages 12 years and up may earn internships on campus, which range from helping the marketing team to collecting recycling around the building to preparing meals for meetings. To be awarded an internship, students must complete a job application and obtain signatures from staff including a clinician, teacher, and parent or residential supervisor to be eligible. In addition, a client's entire external team (which may include caseworkers, Guardians Ad Litem, districts, or probation officers) is consulted.

Life Skills internships teach soft skills like making introductions, punctuality, initiative, and work ethic. The "pit crew" does basic maintenance on agency vehicles like pumping gas, filling tires, and checking fluids. Teachers' aides assist in classrooms with younger students at the direction of teachers, and may serve as role models, run errands, or support children with academics. Journalism interns plan, research, and write articles for *Tiger's Roar*, Tennyson's monthly student newspaper. *Tiger's Roar* even includes a monthly comic strip created by our resident student cartoonist! Some interns work in the cafeteria, helping with meals and learning about health regulations. Others cook lunch on a monthly basis for new employees during their orientation day, make special breakfasts for Tennyson's Board of Directors

meetings, and bake treats for bus drivers and volunteers. Our attendance clerk learns to work in an office setting, assisting with the collection of attendance and other office tasks.

In addition to internships, students who have demonstrated consistent safety and responsibility skills are given the opportunity to apply for a "hall pass." If approved by the staff supporting the student, the hall pass grants a student access to move freely about campus without a direct adult escort. This "badge of honor" recognizes the hard work that students have put into their academics, treatment goals, and behavior, and offers a tangible payoff.

Finally, community members visit Tennyson's students through the Life Skills Program to share tips about becoming job ready.

Mock interviews prepare students for job hunting, as do conversations about dressing for interviews, managing social media image and presence, and preparing a resume. Other practical skills are gained through field trips that offer students the chance to understand and master public transportation, as well as to visit college campuses.



The Blue Pumpkin

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL LEARNING AT TCC

Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) is the process that adults and children learn to manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.

SEL is part of the Colorado Academic Standards and is directly taught to students, focusing on the following competencies:

Self-Awareness – the ability to accurately recognize our own emotions, thoughts and values, and how they influence our behavior.

Social Awareness – the ability to see the perspective of others and empathize with them, including those from diverse backgrounds.

Responsible Decision Making – the ability to make constructive choices about personal behavior and social interactions.

Self-Management – the ability to regulate one's emotions, thoughts, and behaviors in different situations; the ability to effectively manage stress, controlling impulses, and motivating oneself.

Relationship Skills – the ability to establish and maintain healthy and rewarding relationships with diverse individuals and groups.

Our school has implemented an SEL curriculum called Random Acts of Kindness.

"Chip Reimer did the FORE! putting contest with Tennyson and his partner was a child who has one of the hardest stories I've ever heard, and is one of the bravest girls I've ever known. She has really gotten to a better place because of being seen and supported by people.

Chip and this girl were putting, and she sunk a putt like 65 feet, I kid you not, a hole in one! She went bananas. She'd never seen a golf course before.

We had a big meeting at Tennyson where Colorado Oil & Gas Association (COGA) had its board meeting so the executives from all the companies came to TCC, and at the end we gave tours. Chip was in my group with a whole bunch of other executives— some really great men and women who really care about kids. We were wandering around and went into a classroom. This girl, who happened to be in this classroom and I didn't know it, screamed out Chip's name and said, 'Do you remember me?' and he said, 'Yes I do,' and named her. She came over and gave him a hug. I saw these big executives asking, 'What in the world is this?' How is it that an executive of an oil and gas company actually knows one of these kids and has had that kind of impact?'

That's the kind of guy that Chip is, and that's what Whiting is all about."
