- Seven students who graduated from our high school;

- The 520 children and over 2200 family members we worked with across Colorado who persevered during COVID-19; and
- The replication of our *Rewiring* work into five states outside of Colorado.

There's more. Tennyson officially merged with Families Together, an organization some of you know as Foster Together. By bringing on Families Together as a program of Tennyson, we can support more kids and families in new ways. We are incredibly grateful

for this partnership and all it brings. We are broadening and strengthening the circle of support around kids and families by building communities from the inside out.

2020 has been a year of tragedy and triumph for the entire nation — and it's not over yet. But we are beginning our new fiscal year stronger




than ever thanks to people like you – those who learn about, support, advocate for, and care for Tennyson.

WALK A MILE PROJECT



Our kids and staff shared their stories with one another and with those offering support from beyond our walls through the Walk a Mile Project, a narrative art installation made up of shoes decorated to be as complex and colorful as the kids, staff, and histories that make up Tennyson.

Kids and staff "practiced" their narrative designs with a paper template and created their own art to represent healing, growth, and the future. After they completed their paper "practice shoes", the kids decorated real shoes.

These shoes are symbolic of our kids and staff, walking out of the painful stories of their past, beyond our campus walls, and into the new stories they're writing.

monthly dinner delivery and friendly note. Every day, families do the hard work of rewiring children's brains so they can see their own inherent worthiness, and we want to cheer them along. Kids heal when a few consistent adults peel off those 'bad kid' labels over and over again, replacing them with messages about their true human

worth. Getting to know the child, noticing their interests and desires, and encouraging them sets them up for success. In our first year as a program of Tennyson, our Families Together team has sent cheers (and warm dinners!) to the moms, dads, foster parents, and grandparents helping children live without labels."

I hoped it would help give them a more meaningful Christmas, as it did for me. Fast forward a few years and I realized that my father was very involved at the Tennyson Center, serving on the board and as Chairman for a term. He and

others proposed the idea of a 'free' fundraising dinner in Denver and proceeded to inaugurate these dinners. I attended many of those
